

Prevent Risk Assessment – September 2021

Landmarks College considers the Prevent Duty as an important element within our duty to safeguard learners from preventable harm, alongside the need to consider contextual safeguarding issues. The Prevent and Contextual Safeguarding Risk Assessment will be updated annually and in conjunction with updates to the Counter Terrorism Local Profile (CTLP); updates from regional safeguarding networks; updates from the police, and other national guidance.

Although Landmarks' sites are not priority areas within the East Midlands or South Yorkshire CTLP, we recognise that the college is close to Sheffield and Derby which are both considered to be high risk areas by the local police. The college has learners who reside in Nottinghamshire, Derbyshire, and South Yorkshire and we therefore closely monitor the potential risks that arise from those locations.

The data above has been determined based on the following sources, however the results should be taken with caution due to not knowing specific statistics relating to safeguarding concerns within each local authority. In line with Ofsted's recent review, the college takes the view that sexual abuse and harassment may be happening even if it is not being reported; therefore, we have applied this to child sexual exploitation also and increased the risk rating within all areas to 'medium'.

Regional Priorities (CTLP)

The priority areas are currently the same across the East Midlands and South Yorkshire.

East Midlands CTLP (Nottingham House, The Coach House, The Archer, Littlemoor House, Apperknowle Farm)	South Yorkshire CTLP (Milestone House)
Self-initiated terrorism - The threat for individuals acting on their own is not linked to one specific ideology, attacks in the past have been committed by those with an Islamist and Extreme Right Wing ideology and others who have no ideology at all.	
Right wing terrorism/extremism (RTW) - The Threat from Right wing remains high. During 2020, three groups faced proscription - Sonnenkrieg Division; Systems Resistance Network; and Feuerkrieg Division. This showcases how the threat from the RW has developed with more groups facing proscription since National Action in Dec 2016.	
Onward extremist travel & potential Syria returnees - Due to the ongoing worldwide pandemic it is highly unlikely that individuals will travel even if travel restrictions begin to ease. There does however remain a risk to local communities from UK citizens returning from Syria and other conflict zones where they may have travelled in support of or to fight against Daesh.	
ALM - Al-Muhajiroun (ALM) is an Islamist extremist group which is supportive of Daesh. Their main aim is to establish an Islamic Caliphate covered by Sharia Law. Highly active within Derby, but also across South Yorkshire.	
Extremism within the secure estate - There is a risk of prisoners both TACT (those charged and sentenced with terrorist related offences) and Non-TACT (those charged and sentenced to non-terrorist related offences) being radicalised in prison and radicalising others.	
Mixed, Unclear or Unstable (MUU) – This brings together what was formerly investigated under Extreme Left Wing, Anarchist, Environmental Extremism, Animal Rights Extremism and Single Issue threats including the emerging issue of 'Involuntary Celibates' ('Incel').	

Emerging Issues

- Mental Health – The impact of living in isolation and not having access to the same level of support may have adversely affected some individuals' mental health and place them at increased risk of becoming radicalised by extremist groups online.
- Hostile State Activity – The threat from Hostile State Activity remains substantial, with Russia, China and Iran presenting the greatest threat to the UK.

- EU Exit – It is assessed that threats from the far right, Northern Ireland and increased community tensions are a realistic possibility in response to Brexit.
- Protest/conspiracy groups – Due to Covid-19 restrictions, group meetings and protests have shifted onto other platforms, and the UK media has documented a spread of conspiracy theories related to this such as QAnon.
 - QAnon is a wide-ranging, completely unfounded theory that Donald Trump is waging a secret war against elite Satan-worshipping paedophiles in government, business and media.

Prevent Risk Assessment

Landmarks recognises that its learners may be more susceptible to becoming radicalised or be more at risk of certain types of abuse due to the nature of their needs, and that this can take place regardless of their location. Currently, the college feels the following concerns are areas of focus to safeguard learners which are being addressed within college action plans:

- Forced labour and labour exploitation
- Location specific knowledge for staff and learners
- Online safety

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
